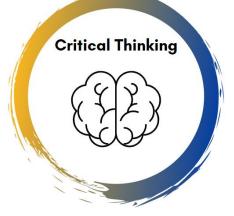

Post-baccalaureate programs

What are they?

Great for...

- Career changers
- Improving academic standing before applying to grad programs
- Preparing to earn a second bachelor's degree

Considerations...

- Programs are not equal to graduate education, but are more advanced than a bachelor's degree
- Can be used to take pre-requisites for graduate or professional programs
- Typically 8-12 months
