You may qualify for the California College Promise Grant if you:


- Are a student at a California community college, and have been determined to be a resident, or to be exempt from non-resident fees under AB 540

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HSI STEM PASS GO Program



The HSI STEM PASS GO Grant was awarded to San Bernardino Valley College to provide support mechanisms that are intended to enhance success, completion, graduation and transfer rates of Hispanic students, low-income students and underrepresented students in the STEM discipline.






