## Overview of Programs, Services, Staffing, & Support

## **Budget Item: Stdt Life Dev. Specialist 2**

With the growing trend of student enrollment, high impact, and high level of programming the need to increase the office staff was crucial therefore the majority of our funds are allocated towards our Stdt Life Dev. Specialist 2 position. The additional staff member has expanded our ability to implement a comprehensive set of social, cultural, educational development programs for the UC Riverside community, especially as related to our Peer Mentor Program, annual programs (Semana de la Mujer, Raza Grad, Youth Conference) and MUNDO. Provide a liaison with Chicano/Latino student organizations. In addition to programming this allowed, us to help ameliorate the workload of our current staff and provide full time front desk coverage and office management.

His narrative was meaningful for our transfer students that were able to relate to his struggles. He presented, took Q&A and followed by a raffle for our students.

#### February 25, 2019

#### Mujer Mariposa: Voices of Womxn on the Periphery

Mujer Mariposa: Voices of Womxn on the Periphery is a short documentary film which juxtaposes the stories of migrant and refugee womxn across various cultures in the context of the united states. This was a lecture and workshop by creator Diana Cervera, for the audience explore narratives, process of healing through writing, and highlight the voices of womxn of color.

## February 26, 2019 Las Profes Panel Participants: 49

This event was informational panel of UCR Chicana/Latina Profesoras, followed by a Q&A. Light refreshments were provided to the audience.

#### Cafecito Hour: Raza Graduate Students (Mujer Identified)

#### Participants: 14

As part of Semana de la Mujer the Graduate Students will host a Cafecito Hour for Mujer Identified graduate students, this was a closed space for those who identify.

#### February 27, 2019

## E&G Yoga Series: CSP Session (Closed to Mujer Identified)

#### Participants: 9

As part of Semana de la Mujer, this Yoga session served as a closed space to mujer or female identified individuals. This event was a space of healing and release for folks, that had never practiced trauma informed yoga.

#### Hands-on Crafts with Monica Lopez

#### Participants: 22

Monica Lopez will share her experience as a mujer who cultivated her own small business. She taught the audience her craft through this hands-on earring-making workshop.

## February 28, 2019

### Resiliency: The Gift our Ancestors Gave

## Participants: 43

Like a butterfly rising, in our wings, we carry our strength and through our spirits, we heal. We used this space and brought in spoken word artist Venessa Marco to talk about her story in healing and addressing the issues of diversity and Afro-Latinidad in our community. This was a collaborative event between our office and African Student Programs.

#### March 1-2, 2019

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual ¡PRESENTE! Conference

#### Participants:

A queer conference for Latinx/Chicanx/PoC, with a focus on people who self-identify with the Latin/South/Central American diaspora or Brown or Indigenous. Our collaboration with the LGBT Resource Center allowed us to bridge the gap between Semana de la Mujer and PRESENTE by co-sponsoring Cielo Oscuro, a trans-femme, who came to speak on their person narrative as well as their acting. Our office also helps throughout the duration of the program to serve as staff support and allies during the conference.

April 3, 2019 La Cosecha Participants: 6 This event is an afternoon at the UCR Community garden. Participants are invited to harvest oranges for the 18th Annual César E. Chávez 5K Run/Walk. We will learn about social, environmental, and economic sustainability through the R'Garden.

#### April 13, 2019

#### **Radio Aztlan Music Festival**

Participants: 500

The 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Radio Aztlan Music Festival commemorates the history of the Radio Aztlan station at KUCR by bringing together musica and cultura. We utilize this space to bring community and embrace the history of Chicano music within our work.

#### April 17, 2019

## 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Oscar Romero Lecture

Participants: 34

Distinguished speaker, Maestra Carolina Fuentes Lead a lecture focused on the social reciprocal dynamic between music, musicians, repression and social mobilization in El Salvador. Maestra Carolina is a former protest singer and survivor of the Salvadoran civil war and a twenty-year veteran news anchor for Univision. This was the 7<sup>th</sup> annual lecture commemorating the life and work of Monseñor Oscar Romero.

#### April 18, 2019

### Nuestro Derecho A Cantar: Film Screening & Platica

Participants: 48

Distinguished speaker, Maestra Carolina Fuentes lead a special film screening of her own work on the social reciprocal dynamic between music, musicians, repression and social mobilization in El Salvador. Following the film screening, she led a Q & A, and group session about the film and her work.

#### May, 1, 2019

## Cinco de Mayo Nooner Participants: 250

The Cinco de Mayo Nooner is a traditional event that happens as a celebration of our culture and community. We had Mariachi, community vendors and student orgs that hosted food sales. It serves as a way to engage and educate our student population.

## **Budget Item: Student Development and Programming**

Through the funds we were able to provide comprehensive programs and services that support and promote student academic, interpersonal, and career development. This allows to empower students to thrive and grow academically, intellectually, emotionally, physical, and socially. In addition to programs we were able to fund student travel and programs such as the Allied Media Conference, UC Santa Barbara Latin American and Iberian Studies Undergraduate Conference, 2019 International Conference on Robotics and Automation ACS National Meeting, Mujer Conference, and the WERC Environmental Design Contest.

## **Budget Item: General Operating Costs and Infrastructure**

CSP is investing in equipment and furniture to meet the needs of the office. We purchased general supplies, buttons and button maker, computer software, computer equipment, parking permits, office furniture, and helped support recurring monthly charges such as the copier lease. In addition to increase visibility and branding our office purchased insignia items such as staff polos, sweatshirts, camera supplies and banners.

## **Budget Item: Staff Professional Development**

Currently, money allocated for professional development is highly limited; thus, restricting opportunities for staff and student development. Through this fund, we are able to attend meetings, conferences, etc. The Director and Assistant Director attended the Chicanx Latinx Leadership Conference, NASPA Conference, UC Cultural Centers System Wide Meeting and also funded our membership for the California Council of Cultural Centers in Higher Education.
