# THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES UCR STUDENT HEALTH APPROACH TO SENSITIVE EXAMS AND YOUR RIGHT TO A CHAPERONE DURING AN EXAM OR PROCEDURE

#### WE LISTEN – WE CARE

During your visit, you should always feel comfortable and safe, listened to, and heard, valued, and respected. If you experience anything less from UCR Student Health, we want to hear from you. Please contact the Office of Patient Experience at (951) 827-3031. If you've been harassed or assaulted, you can contact UCR Title IX Office for help at (951) 827-7070, or <u>Title X reporting</u>.

### WE'RE HERE FOR YOU

At UCR Student Health, we know that some medical exams and procedures are more sensitive than others. We want you always to be comfortable. A sensitive exam is a physical exam of a person's genitals or rectum; or any physical exam of the breasts of a person whose gender, gender identity, or gender expression is female.

We have trained chaperones to help make sure sensitive exams and procedures are done in a safe, comfortable, and professional way. If you ever feel uneasy or need more information about what will happen during your exam, please ask us. We are here to help.

#### WHEN SHOULD I EXPECT A UCR STUDENT HEALTH CHAPERONE?

A chaperone should be offered to you at the time of a visit or procedure where a sensitive exam is expected. You can accept or decline the chaperone. You can also request a chaperone for an exam or procedure that is <u>not</u> sensitive in nature.

#### HOW CAN I LEARN MORE?
